Georg Kopprasch was born sometime before 1800, pursued a career as a horn player at least until 1832, and composed

two sets of horn etudes which includes this set of 60 etudes, Op. 6. Most of the etudes focus on technical problems relating to the high range of the Horn. Twenty Counterparts
Written to guide the player through the basics to the more advanced techniques on the Tuba, this book is divided into a series of 14 exercises that include:
LONG TONES - Transpose the variations to fit your needs.
TONE DEVELOPMENT- The Bruckner exercise begins in C and can be transposed into whatever key fits the musician's needs. Exercises C-E should be played as written. Exercises F-N is a series of patterns that can be transposed if needed. In general the focus is the development of good tone, and use of air.
THREE NOTE LIP-SLURS- Play these slowly and focus on proper slurring. The variations are patterns to be transposed to the instrument's key.
FLEXIBILITY LIP-SLURS- These are patterns that should be transposed using the series of fingerings established in the three note lip-slur section.
LOW/HIGH RANGE EXERCISES- Use excerpts, etudes, and literature to supplement this exercise.
TONGUING/TECHNIQUE- Use exercises from the Arban Complete Method for the Tuba and Clarke Technical Studies for the Cornet to supplement these patterns. To multi-task use scales to focus on these areas. Plus many more.
